The French take this integral part of their culture very seriously, and so should you! Pay extra attention to proper pairing of food and wine and don't forget "bon appetit"!

# THE REAL PERSON; THE MONK, EMILION

As a young man, Emilion was a baker for the Count of Vannes, in the north-west of France. He used to secretly feed the poor behind his greedy master's back.

One day, the Count grew suspicious of Emilion and stopped him on his way out of the castle. When he asked Emilion what he was carrying, the young man lied and told him that it was just some wood. When the Count asked to see, milion opened his coat...

The Bread had miraculously turned into wood. Having satisfied his master's curosity, Emilion sontinued on his way, with his coat full of bread...

Unfortunatly for Emilion, news of his miracle spread quickly and he was forced to leave Vannes... Tired of the fame, he chose a holy exile and began a pilgrimage south. On his way to Spain, he stopped in the owns of Saujon and Saintonge where he worked again as a baker.

Legend has it that the other monks were jealous of his divine reptuation and hid his baking tools just when the bread needed to be removed from the oven. Not wanting to burn the bread, Emilion used his bare hands to remove the loaves, miraculously returning unharmed

After his second miracle, Emilion continued south until he stopped in the small town of Asxumbas. Emilion chose a large limestone rock in the village to begin carving out his mitage and dedicated the rest of his life to worship, where it is said that he performed miracles.

After his death on January 16th 787, his work was taken over by the Monks. They continued to toil for over 300 years, eventually finishing what is now the famous monolithic church that still stands today. And so the village of Saint Emilion as born...




